Yondr Pouches

Day one of next term will see the introduction of Yondr pouches for secondary students. Like all schools, we want to provide an environment conducive to learning and we believe having a phone-free space is vital to this goal. We want our classrooms to be free of mobile phone distractions and our playground full of students interacting with each other face-to-face.

To achieve this, mobile devices are no longer to be used by students at any time of the day. We will trial the following process:

- Each student will be allocated a pouch in morning roll call. They must turn off their device and place it in the Yondr pouch, where it will stay for the day. The pouch will be locked and retained by the student.
- At the end-of-day assembly, the pouch will be unlocked for access to devices.
- If students arrive late or need to leave early, they will follow the above process at the front office when signing in/out.
- If these procedures are not followed, a student will be given a warning and a
 negative incident recorded. Their device will be placed in the Front Office and
 returned to the student at the end of the day. A second offence will result in a
 parent/carer needing to come to the school for a conversation and return of the
 phone. A formal warning of suspension will be issued. A third offence will result in
 suspension for continued disobedience.
- Damaged or lost pouches will incur a \$15 replacement fee.

As always, parents/carers are able to contact the school and leave messages for students if absolutely necessary. A more detailed policy statement will come home soon. We are looking forward to a phone-free learning environment.

K/1/2

Term 1 has been a busy term with all students working extremely hard since they returned from holidays. We have been busily working on our reading and sight words. As a result, all students have moved up at least 1 reading level which is pleasing. The students are working on narrative text and building their writing stamina. During maths students have been concentrating on number facts and using them to solve addition and subtraction facts quickly. They have also been learning about patterns. We have had a great time learning about living and non-living things in science, as well as the weather in creative arts, science and geography. K/1 has created some great artworks based around their learning this term.

Year 3/4

Students have had a busy and exciting Term 1. They have been participating and engaging in a range of learning activities. We have been reading the book Matilda by Roald Dahl together and students have been completing activities such as writing character descriptions and planning their own prank that Matilda could use on her parents! Already this term we have seen some amazing pieces of writing with our new 'Quick Write' program - great job! In numeracy we have been exploring a range of concepts, including 3 and 4-digit subtraction with trading. Although we have had some disruptions, students have shown an amazing amount of resilience and compassion which we have been discussing during our 'Smiling Mind' sessions. Enjoy your break and see you next term.

Year 5/6

The year 5/6 room has been hard at work between the interruptions of the term. Despite this, I have been impressed with how students have been managing to show growth across areas covered. We focused on narrative writing and the development of literary devices used to improve writing. Using a strategy called 'Quick Write', students have written each morning using a visual prompt. Students are developing more interesting and imaginative short texts in these short sessions. In maths, students continue to learn through whole-group instruction, small group tasks and independent online learning to support all levels. Students have also been engaging in a variety of projects that encourage creative and critical thinking in the area of STEM. We look forward to continuing to develop all these skills next term.

UCPSSA Swimming

On Friday 18th of February 8 students travelled with Mrs James to Woodenbong to participate in the UCPSSA swimming carnival. All students represented the school with honour and should be extremely proud of their efforts. Jay Urquhart-Purdon made it to Zone Swimming at Lismore however, due to flooding the carnival was cancelled.



Lunchtime Gardening Club

This term several students have participated in a lunchtime gardening club with Mrs James. It has been pleasing to see the pride these students have shown in our school environment. Students have planted vegetables in the vegie gardens, along with the creation of a succulent garden and the addition of flowers to some of the existing beds.








STEM

This term we have been coming together as a whole primary group to engage in our new STEM program. STEM is curriculum-based, integrating science, technology, engineering and mathematics. It encourages the application of student knowledge to real-life situations and problem solving. A lesson or unit in a STEM class is typically based around finding a solution to a problem and tends to emphasise project-based learning. These sessions focus on hands-on learning and explore critical thinking, problem solving and creative skills. Students have discussed and built items to help 'Save the Bees', to 'Trap a Leprechaun', to help 'Save Sammy the Snake' and are currently working on building a tower as tall as possible using only dried pasta, sticky tape and string.









SECONDARY NEWS

Year 9/10 Food Technology

Students have been studying Food Trends this term while learning some new skills. They have prepared Bubble Tea, Acai Bowls, Cookies and Cream Fudge, Chicken and Waffle cones with Maple Bacon and Honey Mustard Sauce, Sushi Burgers and Sushi.





Maths

Students have had a fun term in Mathematics studying various content including number, angles, Pythagoras' Theorem, surds, bivariate data, graphing and more!

We celebrated "Twosday" (22.2.22) where students engaged in a fun day of twos. It was great to see teachers and students verse each other in the table tennis championships, along with those dressed up in tutus, ties, tiaras, tie dye and as twins.

Students also challenged their memories on "Pi-Day" (3.14), attempting to recall the infinite number of digits after 3.14! A big thank you to Year 12 students for helping to compare the bullying data using a regression line for Harmony Day.

Finally, we wrapped up the term with assessments and revision. It is rewarding to see so many students putting in their best efforts in class and on tasks. Mrs Tessmer & Mr Anderson are looking forward to another fun-filled, rewarding term in Mathematics!







Year 9/10 Child Studies

Child Studies have been learning how to care for new-born babies. They have practised bathing, wrapping and nappy changing newborns. Next term they will be caring for "their own babies" – computer-simulated of course.





Year 11 Hospitality

Hospitality students are working towards a Certificate II in Hospitality. This term they have focused on the TAFE competencies 'Use Hygienic Practices for Food Safety' and 'Participate in Safe Work Practices'. COVID SAFETY

Using a rapid antigen test?

What you need to know if you test positive.



Who should do a rapid antigen test.

If you have any COVID-19 symptoms, or are a household, social, workplace or education contact of a positive case, you should do a rapid antigen test. You can also test before an event or if visiting vulnerable family members. There may be other situations where you do a test.



The four things to do if you test positive.

1. You must register your positive test result on the Service NSW website or app so you can be linked to important health care support and advice based on your COVID-19 risk. If you or someone in your family can't register online, please call Service NSW on 13 77 88.

If you require a free telephone interpreter, call 131450, say the language you need in English and ask the interpreter to connect you to Service NSW.

- 2. You and your household must self-isolate immediately for 7 days. Important information on self-isolation and how to manage COVID-19 at home will be provided when you register with Service NSW or can be found atnsw.gov.au.
- 3. Tell people who you spent time with from the 2 days before you started having symptoms or 2 days before youtested positive (whichever came first) that you have COVID-19. This includes your social contacts, workplace and/orschool.
- 4. Monitor your symptoms and follow the health advice issued to you when you register your positive rapid antigen test.
